Let's Design a Record 05 February 2016

Pera Learning organized the workshop *Let's Design a Record* for ages 15+ as part of the exhibition *This is Not a Love Song: Video Art and Pop Music Crossovers*, which focused on the relationship and crossovers between video art and pop music.

Inspired by the record covers displayed in the exhibition, participants of this workshop put their own portrait photograph on the record covers by using the Cyanotype technique. Next, they colored the covers to their liking and wrote a text using calligraphic techniques. They designed stone records out of wood and then printed different records using serigraphy. At the end of this enjoyable workshop, which combined various techniques, participants had their own records and record covers.
